1960: Greensboro NC sit-in

1963: M. Evers; March on Washington;

JFK assassinated

1964: Vietnam War ramped up

1965: 1st draft card burning

1968: MLK, RFK assassinated

1970: Kent State students killed

1971: Voting age lowered to 18 years

1972: Watergate begins

1973: Roe v. Wade decided; end of Vietnam War


1974: Nixon resigns


Significance

- Far-reaching goals included public AND private equality.
- ➤ Women (and men) are made, not born.
- > Impact on nearly all aspects of American life.
- Inspiration for later movements.

Commonalities

- Inspiration from popular texts

Post-1920 Letdown


- Post-WW I retreat into personal life






NOW founding meeting, 1966


- > 1964: Title VII prohibits job discrimination

Young Women Organize




1968 Miss America pageant protest




1970 Strike


