Grace loves the library. She loves the friends she meets there: Ms. Kim, Ms. Heather - and Mr. Owl and Baby Bear, of course. She's sees these friends each week during storytime at George Latimer Central Library, where she gets to sing, dance, and play.

Saint Paul Public Library staff have created programs like storytimes and designed "play and learn" spaces at branches in order to cultivate a foundation for literacy and learning starting with our youngest patrons.



Kelsey Johnson-Kaiser, Youth Services Manager at the library, says "play and learning are two sides of the same coin - children can't have one without the other."

The research backs her up. According to a study by the American Academy of Pediatrics, "cultivating the joy of learning through play is likely to encourage long-term academic success."



This strategy is working. Grace has fun and can't wait to come back each week. Her mom, Bethany, knows that Grace is learning skills and developing curiosity that will serve her throughout her life.

Having recently moved to Saint Paul, their family has yet another reason to love the library - a new community.

Saturday Live!

This literacy-based program features performers that are both entertaining and have the ability to promote the joys of reading and libraries to young audiences. Children engage with puppets, magicians, wild animals, storytellers and more.

Multi-language storytimes

The library offers storytimes for kids and families of multiple ages in English, Spanish, Karen, Hmong, Amharic, Oromo, and more.

Beanstack

This is a personalized service designed for families with young readers. Patrons can log their reading, earn badges, receive rewards, and even receive weekly reading recommendations for their child.
