**Sherrie Fernandez-Williams** earned an MFA from Hamline University. She is the author of *Soft: A Memoir*. She has received a Minnesota State Arts Board Artist Initiative Grant, a Beyond the Pure Fellowship, a SASE/Jerome Grant, and is a 2021 Jerome Hill Artist Fellow. She was a Loft Mentor Series winner in Creative Nonfiction and a Jones' Playwright Commission Award Winner, and she was selected for the Givens Black Writers Collaborative. Her poems and essays have been published in literary journals, including *New Limestone Review*, *Aquifer: The Florida Review*, and *the minnesota review*.

**Shannon Gibney** is a writer, educator, activist, and author of *See No Color* and *Dream Country*, young adult novels that won Minnesota Book Awards. She is on the faculty in English at Minneapolis College, where she teaches writing. She is a Bush Artist and McKnight Writing Fellow. She coedited, with Kao Kalia Yang, *What God Is Honored Here? Writings on Miscarriage and Infant Loss by and for Native Women and Women of Color* (Minnesota, 2019), and her latest novel explores themes of transracial adoption through speculative memoir.

**Kathryn Haddad** is a writer, teacher, speaker, and community organizer who explores contemporary Arab American experiences and reflects on the political reality of life for Arab and Muslim Americans. She received an Bush Fellowship for her work with the Arab American community; the 2018 Kay Sexton Award from the Minnesota Book Awards; and was a 2019–20 Jerome Fellow in Playwriting. Her plays and creative nonfiction have been published and performed throughout the United States. She cofounded Mizna, one of the few Arab American arts and literary organizations in the United States, and served as its artistic and executive director for twelve years. She is now artistic and executive director of New Arab American Theater Works and teaches high school in Bloomington, Minnesota.

**Carolyn Holbrook** is founder and director of More Than a Single Story, as well as the founder of SASE: The Write Place. She is a writer, educator, and an advocate for the healing power of the arts. Her essay collection *Tell Me Your Names and I Will Testify* (Minnesota, 2020) received a Minnesota Book Award for Memoir and Creative Nonfiction. She is coauthor of Dr. Josie Johnson's memoir *Hope in the Struggle* (Minnesota, 2019), and her essays have been published widely, in *A Good Time for the Truth: Race in Minnesota* and *Blues Vision: African American Writing from Minnesota*, as well as many other publications. She was the first person of color to win the Kay Sexton Award from the Minnesota Book Awards and the Friends of the St. Paul Public Libraries for contributions to Minnesota literature.

**Tish Jones** is a poet, educator, cultural strategist, and cultural producer. She is founder and executive director of TruArt Speaks, an arts and culture nonprofit in St. Paul, Minnesota. She

has performed poetry throughout the United States, and her work can be found **218** Contributors in *A Moment of Silence* (Tru Ruts and the Playwrights' Center) and the Minnesota Humanities Center's anthology *Blues Vision: African American Writing from Minnesota*.

**Douglas Kearney** has published seven collections, including *Sho* and *Buck Studies*, winner of the Theodore Roethke Memorial Poetry Award and the Firecracker Award for Poetry from the Community of Literary Magazines and Presses, and a California Book Award silver medalist in poetry. He has written a collection of libretti, *Someone Took They Tongues*, and his *Mess and Mess* and was a Small Press Distribution Handpicked Selection. His newest collection is *Sho*. His operas include *Sucktion*, *Mordake*, *Crescent City*, *Sweet Land*, and *Comet / Poppea*, commissioned by the American Modern Opera Company. He received a Whiting Writer's Award, a Foundation for Contemporary Arts Cy Twombly Award for Poetry, and residencies and fellowships from Cave Canem and the Rauschenberg Foundation. He teaches creative writing at the University of Minnesota—Twin Cities and lives in St. Paul with his family.

**Tess Montgomery**, a North Minneapolis native, is digital marketing specialist at Twin Cities PBS—TPT and marketing coordinator for More Than a Single Story. She has been a Fellow with the Josie R. Johnson Leadership Academy, a Fellow with New Sector Academy, and a digital production intern with Krista Tippett's *On Being*. She is passionate about the power of grassroots, community-led organizing and believes in the principles of Ubuntu (I am because you are) and Ujima (collective work and responsibility) to build and maintain a strong community. She holds a degree in journalism and mass communications from Drake University.

**David Mura** has written ten books, including the memoirs *Turning Japanese*, a *New York Times* Notable Book; *Where the Body Meets Memory*; and four poetry collections, *After We Lost Our Way*, a National Poetry Contest winner; *The Colors of Desire*, which received the Carl Sandburg Award; *Angels for the Burning*; *The Last Incantations*; and *A Stranger's Journey: Race, Identity, and Narrative Craft in Writing*. He teaches at VONA, a writers' conference for writers of color, and has worked with Alexs Pate's Innocent Classroom, a program designed to improve relationships between teachers and students of color.

**Marcie Rendon** is a citizen of the White Earth Nation. She received a McKnight Distinguished Artist Award and was included on *Oprah Magazine's* list of thirty-one Native American authors to read in 2020. Her novel *Girl Gone Missing* was nominated at the Edgars for the Sue Grafton Memorial Award of G. P. Putnam's Sons, and *Murder on the Red River* received the Pinckley Women's Debut Crime Novel Award and was a finalist for a Western Writers of America Spur Award.

**Samantha Sencer-Mura** is a biracial Japanese American woman living in Minneapolis on stolen Dakota land. She is the executive director at 826 MSP, a writing, tutoring, and publishing center for youth with the mission to empower the next generation of Twin Cities authors. She earned a degree in critical theory and social justice from Occidental College and a degree in school leadership from the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

**Erin Sharkey** is a writer, arts, and abolition organizer, cultural worker, and film producer based in Minneapolis. She has an MFA in creative writing from Hamline University and is the cofounder, with Junauda Petrus, of an experimental arts collective called Free Black Dirt. She is editing *A Darker Wilderness*, a forthcoming anthology of Black nature writing for Milkweed Editions. In 2021, she was awarded the Black Seed Fellowship from Black Visions and the Headwaters Foundation for Justice. She teaches with the Minnesota Prison Writers Workshop.

**신 선 영 辛善英 Sun Yung Shin** is a Korean American poet, editor, children's book author, and writer whose work has been published in *Poetry*, *Bomb* magazine, and the 2021 Gwangju Biennale, among other venues. Her poetry collections have won an Asian American Literary Award and a Minnesota Book Award. Her edited anthologies include *What We Hunger For: Refugee and Immigrant Writers on Food and Family*; *A Good Time for the Truth: Race in Minnesota*; and *Outsiders Within: Writing on Transracial Adoption* (Minnesota, 2021). Her fourth book of poems, *The Wet Hex*, has just been released. With poet Su Hwang she codirects Poetry Asylum in Minneapolis.

His latest book is *The Innocent Classroom: Dis-mantling Racial Bias for Children of Color*.

**Mona Susan Power** is the author of three books of fiction, *The Grass Dancer*, *Roofwalker*, and *Sacred Wilderness*. Her first novel was awarded the PEN/Hemingway Prize. Her memoir *Spirit Car: Journey to a Dakota Past* received a Minnesota Book Award and was selected for the One Minneapolis, One Read program; her nonfiction book *Beloved Child: A Dakota Way of Life* was awarded the Barbara Sudler Award from History Colorado. Her writing has been featured in many publications, including the anthology *A Good Time for the Truth: Race in Minnesota*. She has received a Bush Foundation Fellowship as well as awards from the Minnesota State Arts Board and the Jerome Foundation. She mentors a cohort of emerging Native writers, is a descendant of the Mdewakanton Oyate, and is enrolled on the Rosebud Reservation.

**Kao Kalia Yang** is a Hmong American writer for both children and adults. Her books have been recognized by the National Endowment for the Arts, the Dayton's Literary Peace Prize, the Chautauqua Institute, the National Book Critics Circle Award, and with four Minnesota Book Awards.
